Creating objects

Objects are everything in an InDesign layout. After this lesson, you'll be able to conquer object creation by learning to use InDesign's "drawing tools."

Transforming objects

Now that you've learned how to create objects, the next step is being able to "transform" them—scale, rotate, shear, and flip (reflect) them from a preselected part of the object. After this lesson, you'll be able to move and change the size of objects precisely without ever pulling out a calculator.

Character of type

Most of what makes up the "look" of the type you use (the type's character) happens in the character panel. After this lesson, you'll be able to identify and apply the basic features of the character panel.

Paragraph formatting

Unlike character formatting, which is the look of the selected characters, paragraph formatting is the look of the entire paragraph. After this lesson, you'll be able to control type alignment, paragraph indents, spacing between paragraphs and more.

Formatting tabs

While tabs are an important basic feature of type formatting in InDesign, its inner workings are a mystery to many beginners. After this lesson, you'll be able to format tabs with ease and apply your skills to align text in columns.

Adding space

From em spaces and en spaces to hair spaces and flush spaces, InDesign has it all. After this lesson, you'll be able to identify the various kinds of type spacing and add these to your designs.

Give me a break

Paragraph breaks are just the beginning of the kinds of breaks you can apply to type in InDesign. After this lesson, you'll be able to identify and apply various kinds of type breaks.

Simple Type Styles

Paragraph style efficiency

As the main type formatting feature, paragraph style is, by far, the most efficient way to format type with total consistency, and to update or totally change that formatting throughout a document in seconds. After this lesson, you'll be able to format multiple pages of type with amazing speed and consistency.

15 Character style precision

After setting up and applying your paragraph styles, you may want to finetune the character formatting of some of the text within a paragraph. After this lesson, you'll be able to apply character styles to take the precision of your formatting within a paragraph to the next level.

Type with Objects

16 Text wraps

Text wraps allow you to have your text run around various objects on a page. After this lesson, you'll be able to describe all of the ins and outs of wrapping text.

17 Text frame options

While formatting text is important, controlling the options within the object that contains the text can be equally important. After this lesson, you'll be able to uncover the many important options available to allow you to format the object that contains your text.

Adding Graphics

18 Placing graphics

Graphics of any kind are Placed (File > Place) into an InDesign layout, NEVER copied and pasted. After this lesson, you'll be able to place graphics into an InDesign layout and be in control of all the images in your layout.

19 Controlling linked graphics

Sometimes mysterious things can happen with graphics in a layout when you first open it. The links panel will help you easily solve these mysteries without losing a beat. After this lesson, you'll be able to navigate the various options in the links panel.

Working with Color

20 Creating swatches

You can imagine how important color is to any beautiful layout. Creating and applying your colors easily is the purpose of the swatches panel.

21 Stroke of genius

Color can be added inside an object as a fill or along its edge as a stroke. This lesson will concentrate on the many options available in the Stroke panel.

Creating Effects

22 Adding transparency

Imagine being able to see through parts of your design to the objects below. That's what opacity and blending modes allow you to do, which can literally add a whole other dimension to your design. After this lesson, you'll be able to apply a whole variety of blending modes to unlock the innermost secrets of using transparency.

23 Adding effects

When InDesign was first introduced over 20 years ago, one thing that separated it from any layout application that came before was the ability to apply Photoshop-like effects right in a layout. After this lesson, you'll be able to apply various kinds of shadows, glows, feathering, and dimensional effects that will spark your imagination with innovative ways of designing a page.

Exporting and Printing

24 Exporting to PDF

PDF has become the most important export out of InDesign. After this lesson, you'll be able to demystify the vast number of PDF Exporting choices and decide the best option for your needs.

25 Package your layout

Sometimes, a commercial printer will want to print from your native files instead of a PDF. After this lesson, you'll be able to apply the Package feature to automatically collect all linked images and typeface used in a layout.
